#### YOUR SUPPORT GAVE ANTHONY A CHANCE TO START OVER

"I had a lot of dark demons in me," says Anthony. At 34 years old, Anthony had spent most of his years living a street life of drug houses, parties and hustling to support his habits.

But Anthony hadn't always been in such darkness.

As a child, Anthony treasured being raised by his grandparents. He has fond memories of making biscuits and gravy with his grandmother and helping her feed the birds. He remembers his grandfather setting an example of working hard to provide for his family.

But an ache of loss and loneliness left
Anthony without direction as a teenager. Both
of his grandparents died within a year. An uncle
took Anthony in, but was a bad influence and
let Anthony do whatever he wanted. Anthony
dropped out of school, made money on the side,
and dove headlong into a life of late nights at
bars and casinos. He was always drinking. Often
on drugs. And always angry inside.

One night, while doing drugs with friends, a girl in the group overdosed. Anthony watched in disbelief as no one did anything to help her.

"All they did was dig in her pocket. They took her money, took her stuff, and they left her. And that woke me," he says. "That could have been me."

That moment, Anthony decided to change his life and get help. "Deep down, I thought I was happy, but I wasn't happy," he says. "I spent all my money to keep luxury and keep friends

around. But when I chose to stop that lifestyle, I had nobody. I had turned my back on my family. I had hurt so many people."

As soon as he stepped inside the Grant County Rescue Mission, Anthony knew he was in the right place. "Being here made me realize that I don't have to be around all of that evilness. For the longest time, I didn't know who God was, until I walked into this building."

"This place is teaching me how to become a man, a better person," says Anthony. "And God, I'm really knowing who He is now."

Now Anthony wants to be the positive role model he didn't have growing up. "I'm fighting for the ones that are behind bars and on the street, to show them a better way," he says. "I don't need to be rich or famous. I want to fix up a home. I want a woman to come home to and be loved. I want to be that uncle who is there for my nieces and nephews and give them a life so they're not alone like I was."
