

# YOU PROVIDED BRITTNEY A WAY OUT OF ADDICTION

"I WAS GLAD TO HAVE SOMEWHERE I COULD REESTABLISH MYSELF."

In her early 20's, Brittney was doing better than many of her peers. A single mother, she had a good job, a home of her own, a nice car. Then she suffered a foot ailment and got a prescription for the narcotic hydrocodone. "I was addicted before I knew what addiction was," Brittney recalls.

Brittney went from one doctor to another to get more of the drug. Eventually, she turned to methamphetamine to feed her addiction. In June 2021, after nearly 20 years of drug use, she had lost her job, her house, her car ... everything.

Evicted from her apartment, Brittney stayed wherever she could: a bathroom in a church, empty storage units, even a car parked behind a restaurant. She remembers burning candles in the car to keep warm. Finally, Brittney was arrested for breaking into an abandoned house for shelter.

In addition to providing a warm place to sleep, jail reconnected Brittney with Jesus Christ and offered her a path back to the stable lifestyle she had lost. "They asked me if I would do drug court," she says. "I knew it would dismiss all my pending felonies upon completion." In October 2023, the court ordered Brittney to come to Open Heart Women's Shelter.

Brittney was released from jail in the middle of the night with just the clothes on her back. "I walked around all night until the shelter opened," she says.

Brittney's first impression of Open Heart was overwhelmingly positive. "I'd never been in a shelter. I'd always had my own place or lived on the streets. But it was great. It was very inviting," she says.

"In the beginning, it might look like a shelter, but it really becomes a home."

In the beginning, Brittney admits she was just "checking boxes. I wanted to get through the program as fast as possible. But now I see it differently. I was glad to have somewhere I could reestablish myself. I think the structure of the program is what's made me successful. And the faith-based aspect was really inviting for me."

Brittney looks forward to having a place of her own and getting back into the medical field. She has a strong relationship with her daughter, now a junior at Ball State. And best of all, she has been clean and sober for more than a year.

"I recently heard addicts have the only disease that is cured by a spiritual awakening. That's definitely what happened to me."

Brittney is actively involved with a local church and attends daily devotions at Open Heart. Her favorite Bible verse is 1 Corinthians 10:13. "It says that God will not tempt you beyond what you can withstand, and He'll provide a way out for you," she says.
